2. Opening Session (15 minutes)

Dr. Mina Hassan Shibis, chair lady of AWARFAN Somalia explained to the participants that AWARFA Somalia Cooperative Ltd is a women-led network dedicated in empowering women across Somalia's livestock and agricultural sectors. Established in 2023, AWARFA brings together cooperatives, pastoralists, and farmers, offering them skills, resources, and a platform to thrive. By fostering collaboration and sustainable practices, AWARFA drives positive change in rural communities and supports women's economic empowerment.

She emphasized that this meeting has special importance for women farmers and pastoralists, so we expect active participation from all.

3. Session 1: The Role of Women Farmer Cooperatives (45 minutes)

4. Session 2: Introduction for fodder production (1 hour)

First STS chair Ali Ilmi had explained how animal fodder can be produced before entering into the business is important to think and consider kind of grass that is appropriate to our climate and seeds is feasible to our country water and soil

- 1 Seeds planting
- 2 Seed sowing

And also procedures can develop fodder improvements through cooperative level and to evaluate the geographic zone.

National University lecturer Dr.Shabeel had welcomed this good discussion among the participants and stressed how river fishing been neglected example in Balad riverbank

SCSET chair Dr Khalid advised to concentrate on seed development weather it's for animals or humans, at that point there's a gap needs to cover as making study for clarifying it's values.

We need appropriate techniques for fodder production development as a local production.

Ahmed Calaf chair of Calaf group knowing our context in our country the access is limited.

At side of our expertise we concentrate on local grass production and success story was our first pilot project was to distribute our local production and beneficiaries welcomed.

Ministry of agriculture advisor Dr Mohammed Bare had explained brief crop improvement system, I would like to address the appropriate seed we need and also to stop foreign seeds exported in the country not controlled and not certified by the Ministry of Agriculture. we experience that these seeds cause in protectable pests so I would advise seed growers and government should control the seeds.

AMAL Banks representing Mr. Abdiqafaar, talked on how to invest small farmers in production and raised a question on how to encourage and explain to the Somali business group on investing small farmers

Mr, Mohamed Nur Garibaldi, Nuros9 company chair, shared with the group about his activity in the agriculture sector and the forming of cooperative supported by IOM. They produce all kinds of vegetables, with his support they sell their products to Hayat mall, Restaurants and also big markets in Mogadishu.

He suggested that cooperatives should think about availability of markets and their needs and also it is important to educate and encourage consumers the use of local production.

Gabyow animal fodder chair lady Miss Faaduma explained her engagement in see and fodder processes, she is in charge of women cooperative in Balad. She encouraged the use of local seeds.

Darusalam seed grower representatives Mr Abdi Ibrahim had explained the problem of seeds and suggested the use of local certified seds.

WAAB representing Eng Omar had explained thei interest to start local seed Banking as not to depend on export seed that is not useful to our land.

Animal fodder growing process through cooperatives.
